



PLEASE PICK UP — IT'S GOD CALLING!

When Matthew Bernhard was in second grade, his pastor spoke to his class about religious life. Listening intently, young Matt felt an immediate sense of peace and desire for the priesthood. But, because he was so young, he wasn't sure if God was "officially" calling him.

Fast forward to high school. Matt was attending a Steubenville Youth Conference, when during the Eucharistic Adoration, he felt God's love profoundly. "At that moment, I knew in my heart, that God was reminding me of my calling in second grade!" Matt exclaimed. "It was time to start actually doing what He was asking me to do."

Matt is now in his sixth year of formation at Mundelein Seminary. After applying, a weight was lifted from his shoulders. He had always been independent, but now felt someone beside him, that someone was God. As part of his formation, Matt spent time on retreat in a retirement home run by an order of Catholic nuns. "The love the sisters had for those they were serving was beautiful and so infectious," he shared.

The Kathy Paulsen Hope House provides temporary, emergency shelter and supportive services to individuals and families who are situationally homeless. During their stay, participants work toward securing employment and permanent housing with caring guidance and personal goal-setting.

This ministry goes well beyond furnishing a roof over one's head. It gives those who have hit a bump in life's road a chance to rebuild their confidence and capabilities to live happily and independently again. "Hope House embodies the spirit of its name. Folks come in with no light in their eyes or very little. As they start meeting their goals and having successes, the light comes back on!" shared Inger Erickson, Supervisor of Hope House.

Stephen has benefitted immensely from the safe haven that is, Hope House. Just two days after he became homeless, he lost his job. Faced with two crises simultaneously, he found himself sleeping in his van before being referred to Hope House. Shortly after moving in, he secured a job, is on track for a promotion, and is looking forward to living in a home of his own.

"Hope House has lifted a heavy burden off my shoulders by giving me a place to lay my head at night and food on the table," Stephen said.

In addition to providing shelter, Hope House serves the community in need, within the Diocese of Joliet, with clothing and personal care items. The facility accommodates 15 to 20 clients over a six to eight-week period. Roughly 150 people benefit annually from its services, so funding is crucial.

Stephen offered his deep gratitude and personal thanks to all the CMAA donors, "Without your help, I would not be sitting here, this program would not exist, and people in situations like mine would have nowhere to turn."

Last summer the Catechesis and Evangelization team hosted Joliet Youth Day at Lewis University in Romeoville, as part of a three-year plan supported by Bishop Hicks and the Diocese.

The conference attracted a record 1,200 teens from around the Diocese, including Amelia, a local high school student. She loved the music, the speakers, and the intimacy of Eucharistic Adoration. Amelia shared this insight, "In grammar school you're required to attend religious events, but as high schoolers we chose to be here to help draw us closer to Jesus."

Jim Elias, Catechesis and Evangelization lead, appreciates the profound impact these events have on its attendees. "The experience lights a fire within that creates a higher level of energy around our diocese," said Jim.
